The Graduate Psychology department at NNU offers a Doctorate in Clinical Psychology which will confer the degree of Psy.D. to students who complete the program. NNU's Doctorate in Clinical Psychology is in the process of applying for accreditation with the American Psychological Association (APA) and plans to be the first accredited PsyD program in the state of Idaho. This program is designed as a full-time, residential program. NNU's Doctorate in Clinical Psychology is structured to allow for a Master's in Clinical Psychology to be completed within the first three semesters (41 credits). This program requires that students complete 121 credit hours over fifteen semesters (an average of 60 months), log 3,000 hours of practicum/internship experience, pass a competency exam prior to PsyD candidacy, pass a written and oral comprehensive exam, and successfully complete and defend a PsyD dissertation. Since postdoctoral hours are a requirement for licensure in many states, the graduates do not typically complete all requirements for licensure while enrolled in the program. Once postdoctoral supervision hours are complete, graduates may sit for the Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology (EPPP) exam. Graduates may apply for licensure as a psychologist once they have successfully passed the EPPP exam and any supervised postdoctoral hours required by the licensing board.

Upon graduation and successfully passing the EPPP exam, students are prepared with the professional competencies necessary for psychotherapy and direct delivery of psychological services including entry-level psychological assessments. Since the EPPP is administered at the national level, NNU graduates will find that their degree is moderately portable to other states. Prospective students from outside the state of Idaho can use the table below to investigate whether an NNU PsyD is right for them. Since many states have specific licensure requirements beyond educational requirements, NNU urges all out-of-state applicants to carefully consider the requirements of the jurisdiction in which they wish to practice. Prospective out-of-state students should remember the following: 1) each jurisdiction will have highly specific state requirements beyond the educational requirements that must be completed before a professional license may be granted; and 2) as a general rule, candidates are encouraged to pursue formal licensure in Idaho and apply to another state with their completed credential.
